How it all started – Essential medicines



- First contacts --> with Essential Medicines (EM) group at WHO prior to 1995.
- Dr Stuart Maddin (ILDS Board Member) had a small group of dermatologists help review the list of EMs – Rod Hay did the anti-infectives.
- Since then the ILDS reviews the EM list regularly, with new drugs being added and others removed.





Essential medicines are those that satisfy the priority health care needs of the population. They are selected with due regard to public health relevance, evidence on efficacy and safety, and comparative cost-effectiveness.

Essential medicines are intended to be available within the context of functioning health systems at all times in adequate amounts, in the appropriate dosage forms, with assured quality and adequate information, and at a price the individual and the community can afford.

Next steps – Neglected Tropical Diseases & ICD-11




- In 2007 collaborative work on the scabies initiative led to the beginning of a constructive link with the WHO Neglected Tropical Disease (NTD) group. This started with scabies and ectoparasites and has now broadened into Skin NTDs and more recently Fungal NTDs.
- The ILDS intervention at WHO was partly responsible for
 - a) the adoption of scabies and ectoparasites as Neglected Tropical diseases, and
 - b) the recognition that NTDs often present with skin lesions, and the production of the new WHO training manual for front line health workers.
- In 2008: Jean Hilaire Saurat (ILDS President) started a link with the International Classification of Disease (ICD) group, and together with Robert Chalmers the ILDS played a major role in helping develop ICD-11 for skin disease.

Further Development under ILDS President W Sterry



- In 2012 Wolfram Sterry expanded the realm of collaboration with the WHO so as to include psoriasis (WHO Non Communicable Diseases /NCD) and skin health & ageing (WHO ageing and health initiative).
- 2014: Under the impulse of Chris Griffiths and others the WHO Member States recognized psoriasis as a serious noncommunicable disease (NCD) in the World Health Assembly resolution WHA67.9!
- In 2016 the WHO Global Report on Psoriasis, where the ILDS significantly contributed, was published.
- From 2012-2014, Rod Hay and Toby Maurer on behalf of the ILDS helped the WHO HIV team develop the WHO treatment guide for skin disease in HIV which was published by WHO in 2014.

- 5. producing a global psoriasis atlas to reduce the burden of noncommunicable diseases;
